A Story about Alan Wood, by Alan Wood the Hansa 2.3.

Just a short story about myself, as I am ageing rapidly, and need to get this on paper before it goes out of my memory!

Towards the end of 1995, momentous decisions were being made by a group whose idea it was that everybody should be able to sail, no matter their physical or mental health. They wanted sailing to be possible as a sport for anyone, whatever their physical or intellectual status. So that clever sailor/inventor Chris Mitchell put on his thinking cap and created me, a Hansa 2.3 which everyone can sail, no matter their physical or intellectual condition.

At my simplest, I am just a simple solo sailed craft with a joy-stick for direction; the wind for energy, and a rudder for finding direction. I can also be fitted with a double motor, that can pilot me in any direction or point the sail at any point so that sailing is possible.

I was named *Alan Wood* after one of the principals of the Sailability Branch that had sprung up on Sydney Harbour. Kirribilli was my original home, but this proved too difficult to accommodate the sailors who wanted to sail me, so I was moved initially to Pittwater, then later to Manly, up to Toronto for a couple of years, then back to Manly again.

My first sailor that I knew about was a Hungarian Gentleman called Zoltan, who had been learning to parachute in Canada when he had an unfortunate accident that left him a paraplegic. This meant that he had paralysis from the neck down, with no control from neck to feet. Chris fitted 2 small battery charged motors, one to change the direction of the rudder, the other to manage the sail. Each time I sailed, my batteries were recharged to ensure that I could come back to the starting point. The switch was worked by moving it with a chin switch.

After being stored at Manly, I quickly found a different sailor, as Zoltan had returned to Hungary and was sailing a 2.3 on Lake Baloton. Judith took me over at Manly with a great deal of help from Allan Jones and David Webb, who kept the batteries and motor in prime condition. *(continued on page 4)*

Judith sailed me at Manly for many years, also using the original chin switch, until her other interests took over after a few years,.

Then Philip, a young man coping with Muscular Dystrophy took over and quickly became an expert sailor with his use of the 2 motors, kept in good condition by David.

David also changed the chin switch to a hand switch with a sensitive direction finder. This worked well for several years, until Phil's family moved to the Central Coast, so I was moved up to Toronto so that Phill could sail closer to home.

Philip decided to migrate to Denmark, as he spoke Danish, and conditions for people like him are more comfortable there than in Australia.

Once this change was made, Judith took over again, with her original chin switch. All this time, for over 20 years, I was kept in remarkably excellent condition by David, so this has been an excellent partnership. As Judith grows older, however, the sailing has now eased off, and I am missing my sessions sailing on Manly Cove.
